Hotel Parking

- 1. Hotel entrance is on Grace Street, between North 2nd Street and Front Street. Pull up to this entrance to valet park.
- 2. Valet-parking is included (but not required) for registered hotel guests.*

*For those using valet parking: To request your car, dial 0 for the front desk from within the hotel or (910) 632-2900 before the end of session on Thursday afternoon. Calling the night before for morning use is <u>strongly</u> recommended, minimum of 30 minutes notice is required at all times.

Details for the Tour

- Arrive by 1:45. Arrive by 1:45 pm to check in and go through security. Guests must be through security by 1:55 for the tour to start promptly at 2:00. Late arrivals cannot be accommodated.
- Photo ID Required. Photo ID is required, and your ID must match the first name or nickname, last name, and DOB included on the spreadsheet shared by email. Please review your listing and share any updates well in advance of session. If you are not a US citizen, let the LNC team know your citizenship well in advance.

Walking Directions to Meeting Space

Union Station at 502 North Front Street is about a 6-minute walk from the Courtyard Marriott. From the front of the hotel walk left on Grace Street. Take the first right onto Front Street and walk two blocks.

Parking for Cape Fear Community College

- Free parking is available on a first-come, first-served basis in the CFCC <u>Visitor</u> Lot at <u>408 North</u> <u>2nd Street</u>. The parking pass available <u>HERE</u> must be printed in advance and displayed on your vehicle to use the Visitor lot.
- Limited street parking is available in the blocks surrounding Union Station. Payment can be made onsite or through the <u>Pay-by-Phone app</u>, which requires you to set up a free account.
- Public parking is available in the <u>Wilmington Convention Center Deck</u>. A full list of public parking options is available through the Parking Decks/Lots drop-down on the City of Wilmington <u>Downtown Parking page</u>.
- Be sure to read signs carefully—do NOT park in decks or lots designated for CFCC faculty, staff, or students, or you will be ticketed.

Walking or Parking

Front Street Brewery is about a 5-minute walk from the Courtyard Marriott. From the front of the hotel walk left on Grace Street. Take the first left onto North Front Street and walk 2.5 blocks. A full list of public parking options is available through the Parking Decks/Lots drop-down on the City of Wilmington <u>Downtown Parking page</u>. The closest deck is at <u>115 Market Street</u> (the intersection of Market and 2nd Streets).

The Corning Plant is just a few minutes from the UNCW reception location, and both are about 15 minutes from the hotel in downtown Wilmington. There's probably just enough time to go from Corning to the hotel and back out for the reception, but it may be tight. If you plan to attend the tour and the reception, you may decide you'd rather use the gap to explore the UNCW campus or make a few phone calls instead of rushing downtown and backtracking to UNCW.

If you do stop by the hotel before the reception, we recommend you use street parking or other shortterm options to avoid delays with valet parking and vehicle retrieval in this short window.


