Over the last five years, enrollment in CCP increased 43% in North Carolina.

During the 2021-2022 school year, nearly 70,000 high school students across the state enrolled, compared to 48,630 in 2016-2017.

Today, students enrolled in CCP average an 83-percent success rate compared to a 72-percent success rate of the general student population, not dually enrolled.







Cooperative Innovative High Schools (Early College)

North Carolina's Cooperative Innovative High Schools, consisting of early colleges and other innovative high schools, are small public high schools, usually located on the campus of a community college or university, which expand students' opportunities for educational success through high-quality instructional programming.
