
MISSED OPPORTUNITIES: LATINO EARLY EDUCATION ENROLLMENT IN MECKLENBURG

LARGE SIZE


1 in 5 (~18,000) children under age six in Mecklenburg are Latino

STRENGTHS & CHALLENGES: MECKLENBURG'S YOUNG LATINO CHILDREN

Strong Families

75% live in two-parent families

High Poverty

36% live below the federal poverty level

Mixed Parent Education

31% have parents with less than a H.S. degree; but 23% have parents with a BA degree or more


Mixed Nativity

96% of children are US-born, but 72% have a foreign-born parent(s)

Mecklenburg Latino Children Not Enrolled in ECE Are More Likely To:

- Be of Mexican or Central American descent
- Live in two-parent households
- Have parents with less than a H.S. degree
- Live below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level
- Have a non-employed parent
- Have parents who work non-traditional hours
- Have foreign-born and non-citizen parents
- Live in a linguistically isolated household

*Data used: Public Use Microdata Samples from the 2013-2018 American Community Survey (accessed from IPUMS USA); 5-year estimates are best for analyzing small sub-populations.

**Data limitations: ECE enrollment is based on children age 3-5; PUMA-level (map) enrollment rates have a +/- 5% margin of error; all other estimates have a +/- 2% margin of error or less.
