



[ages 0-44]







# North Carolina's 2030 Attainment Goal




# The Urgency for Increased Educational Attainment

Current projections indicate North Carolina is **44,000 below** where it needed to be to be on target to the 2 million by 2030 goal.




Based on the most recent data available, in 2019 North Carolina had an estimated **1,450,2492** adults ages 25-44 with a high-quality degree or credential.










# **Closing the Attainment Gap**






# Race/Ethnic Composition of Students Enrolled in NC Public Schools (K-12)

43% of NC Public School Students are Black or Hispanic


#### Black, Hispanic, Indian Percentage Composition









### **Hispanic Students Enrolled in NC Public Schools**








# **North Carolina Projected High School Graduates**


# North Carolina's Labor Market Rebounding But Participation Remains Low







#### Building the Foundation: Pre-K to 8

High-quality early learning and strong academic progress in early years helps prepare children for future success.



#### Ready for College & Career

High school completion is a crucial step on the pathway to postsecondary success or the beginnings of a career. Activities that prepare students to navigate the transition to postsecondary include gaining experience in college-level coursework and applying for financial assistanc

#### Postsecondary Access and Success

These metrics capture student progression and educational attainment from high school graduation to postsecondary completion. They indicate relative strengths and weaknesses of Wake County at each stage of the postsecondary pipeline

#### **Labor Market Outcomes**


