Trip Stallings is an education and policy consultant with over 25 years of experience working in North Carolina at the local, regional, and state levels. Current and recent clients include the John M. Belk Endowment, the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, myFutureNC, the North Carolina Education Corps, and the North Carolina Cyber Academy. Prior to his current consulting work, Trip was the Director of Policy Research at the Friday Institute for Educational Innovation at North Carolina State University, where he co-led the Research and Evaluation team. His work there focused on providing timely information about policy-relevant education research to North Carolina policymakers and other stakeholders with education policy decision-making responsibilities. Topics included school vouchers, early-grade reading recovery, teacher career ladders, alternative school district structure and implementation, and funding for community colleges.

His state leadership opportunities have included: managing the Friday Institute's work with the myFutureNC Commission (which led to the creation of myFutureNC); guiding the development of the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics' academic vision for its second campus; co-leading the evaluation of North Carolina's federally funded Race to the Top (RttT) initiatives; developing financial and policy analyses for the North Carolina Digital Learning Plan; co-evaluating the North Carolina School Connectivity Initiative; and co-developing the state's RttT proposal.

Before arriving at the Friday Institute, Trip worked as an education policy analyst for several North Carolina-based groups, including the Center for Teaching Quality, the Hunt Institute, The Program on Public Life at UNC, and the North Carolina Center for Public Policy Research. His work for these groups included research on service-learning and pre-service teachers; locale, local economic conditions, and high school dropout; STEM teacher retention; local school boards; voter participation; "education governors;" and the history of federal involvement in education. He also taught at the middle school level for several years, followed by a stint in teacher education. He has completed graduate work in public policy (MPP, Duke, 2002) and education policy and politics (PhD, UNC-CH, 2010).

Cecilia Holden has served as the first-ever President & CEO for myFutureNC, a statewide initiative focused on educational attainment, since December 2019. The organization is the result of cross-sector collaboration between North Carolina leaders in education, business, and government. In this role, Holden advances the strategic direction and priorities for the organization; collaborates with cross-sector leaders; develops and drives policy that increases North Carolina's level of education attainment; and builds the overall capacity of the organization.

Holden most recently held the position as the Director of Government and Community Affairs for the State Board of Education. In this capacity, she served as the principal contact and staff for the State Board of Education with state

and federal education policy makers and stakeholders, including the NC General Assembly, the Governor's Office, NC state agencies, and the U.S. Congress.

Holden's career includes extensive public and private sector experience. Prior to joining the State Board of Education, she served as the Chief of Staff for the North Carolina Department of Commerce. In addition, her North Carolina public service includes serving as the Special Assistant to the Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources and the Director of Networking Technologies for the Department of Public Instruction. She has a proven track record of establishing and implementing creative strategies to optimize operations, return on investments, and excellence in customer satisfaction.

Holden served as a middle manager with IBM and as the Business Operations Manager for a registered investment advisory firm. During her years with IBM, Holden was a Team Excellence Award winner and an IBM Achievement Club recipient and was selected for the IBM Executive Fast Track program. She built a reputation for implementing high standards for customer service while she oversaw a worldwide network of technical support engineers.

Banu Valladares is a nonprofit innovator and community leader currently serving as the Executive Director of Charlotte Bilingual Preschool (CltBP) in Charlotte, NC. Under her leadership, Valladares has transformed CltBP to respond to community need: the 5-star licensed dual language preschool is now also a nationally recognized 2-generation early childhood education model that builds pathways to economic mobility for children 0-5 years old and their families. Valladares represents the interests of Charlotte's Latinx families and informs early childhood education policy on the Mecklenburg County (NC) Early Learning Initiative Executive Committee, the NC Early Childhood Advisory Council, Care and Learning (CandL, NC), the NC Home Visiting and Parent Education System, and the NC

Early Education Foundation. She is a member of the Association of Fundraising Professionals and serves on the Arts and Science Council Board of Directors and the Latin American Future Search.

Valladares moved to Charlotte from Venezuela in 1982 to attend UNC-Charlotte, where she earned a master's degree in literature. She led statewide arts and education programs at the North Carolina Humanities Council, the North Carolina Arts Council, and SonEdna. In all her service roles, she has built strategic partnerships with national, state, and local agencies, advocating for capacity-building support for community-based African American, Asian American, Latinx, and American Indian cultural organizations.

A. Hope Williams is in her 30<sup>th</sup> year as president of North Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities (NCICU), the statewide office of the 36 private, nonprofit colleges and universities in North Carolina. She works closely with the State of North Carolina and the federal government and with the North Carolina public K-12 and higher education sectors to address education and related public policy and funding issues. In addition, she oversees fundraising for student scholarships and grants as well as the development of collaborative programs for the benefit of NCICU campuses. She joined NCICU in 1986 and has served as president since 1992.

Dr. Williams received her undergraduate degree from Duke University, an MPA from North Carolina State University, and a Ph.D. in Education from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She is a member of the Governor's Cabinet and was named a 2017 CEO of the Year by the *Triangle Business Journal*. She chairs the boards of MCNC, Dupont Circle Investments, and the North Carolina Aquarium Society, serves on the Governor's Education Cabinet and on the boards of the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center and the National Student Clearinghouse, College Foundation, Inc., the National Advisory Board of the Institute for Emerging Issues, the NCWorks Commission, the myFutureNC Commission, and Communities in Schools of North Carolina.

Rhett Brown became the 10th president of Wingate University on June 1, 2015. He earned a BA in English from Wingate College, received his MBA from Wingate University, and completed the work for his Doctor of Education (EdD) at the University of Alabama.

During his first year as president, President Brown established the "One Day, One Dog" day of service and giving. In 2019, more than 1500 volunteers participated in community-wide service projects. To date, close to \$750,000 dollars has been raised to support student scholarships and the 2020 Student Relief Fund.

A first-generation college student, Dr. Brown fostered support for the First-Generation Orientation bridge program. Special programming and monthly workshops guided the inaugural cohort of 50 first-gen students this fall. And in partnership with Union County Public Schools, President Brown established Wayfind—a program that mentors 20 high-potential, at-risk eighth-grade students throughout their tenure at two local high schools. Upon completion of the Wayfind program, all graduates will be awarded a full-tuition scholarship to attend Wingate University.

Under his leadership, the diversity on Wingate's campus has grown by 108%. Non-white students now make up 42% of the undergraduate student body. Major steps have been made in the areas of diversity, equity, and inclusion, including the establishment of a DE&I council, which Dr. Brown chairs. The council helped establish a Unity House in 2020 to support underrepresented students and employees. President Brown's efforts helped secure grant money to go toward eight initiatives covering three primary areas: hiring more minority faculty and staff members; training employees on unconscious bias; and providing more multicultural programming for students.

Most recently, Dr. Brown led the charge to establish a committee to study Wingate's namesake after it was learned Washington Manly Wingate owned and sold enslaved people. The committee will work to reclaim the Wingate name and recommend action to the Wingate Board of Trustees.

A veteran of Operation Desert Storm, President Brown served with Seabees from the U.S. Navy Reserve. He and his family are members of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Monroe, where Dr. Brown currently serves as one of nine vestry members.

Elwood L. Robinson was elected Chancellor of Winston-Salem State University in, September of 2014, by the Board of Governors of the 17-campus University of North Carolina, and he assumed his duties on January 1, 2015. Prior to election as Chancellor at WSSU, he served as Provost and Vice-President of Cambridge College. As Cambridge College's chief academic officer, Robinson has advised the president on matters of educational policy and the development of teaching and academic programs.

A native of Ivanhoe, NC, Robinson graduated magna cum laude from North Carolina Central University in 1978 with a degree in psychology and then earned a master's degree in the field from Fisk University in Tennessee (1980). After completing a pre-doctoral internship at Duke University Medical Center, performing rotations in neuropsychology, psychiatric inpatient and behavioral medicine, and health psychology, he earned a doctorate in clinical psychology from Pennsylvania State University (1986). He later completed his clinical training as a research associate at Duke University Medical Center (1990-1993).

Robinson joined the faculty of NCCU in 1984. In 1993, he was named Director of the Minority Access to Research Careers (MARC) Program, which provides research-training opportunities for students and faculty from minority groups underrepresented in the biomedical sciences. From 1993-1996, Robinson also served as chair of NCCU's Psychology Department. In 2006, Robinson was named founding Dean of the NCCU College of Behavioral and Social Sciences, where he oversaw nine departments, five centers and over 200 faculty and staff. He remained in the post until he left North Carolina for Cambridge College in 2012.

Active in professional and civic organizations, Robinson has received numerous awards and honors over the course of his career. A former National Institutes of Health Fellow, he has received the Sigma Xi Award (1995), the Omega Psi Phi Founder's Award (2007), an Image Award from the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (2003), and the Order of the Long Leaf Pine (2012). He has served on the boards of the YMCA of the Greater Triangle, the Center for Child and Family Health, and the Uplift Foundation, and has served as a delegate for the People to People Citizen Ambassador Program to China, Egypt, and South Africa.

Robinson is married to Denise Robinson, a 1978 NCCU graduate and former elementary school teacher. Together, they have two children: Chanita Robinson Coulter, a graduate of North Carolina A&T State University and schoolteacher living in Charleston, SC; and Devin, a student at North Carolina A&T State University.
