The French Broad Chocolate Factory & Cafe is just 2.2 miles from the Renaissance Asheville Downtown Hotel via Broadway Street. We encourage you to carpool to the factory as parking is very limited. If spaces at the factory are full, please park across the street at Go Store It Self Storage, alongside Riverside Drive in front of RAMP Studios, or in the large lot behind RAMP Studios.

The Center for Craft is a short walk (.2 miles) from the Renaissance Asheville Downtown Hotel.

- Exit the hotel from the side doors opposite the Grand Ballroom, facing the Thomas Wolfe house.
- Walk up the steps to reach East Walnut Street.
- Take a right on East Walnut Street and walk two blocks to turn right on Broadway Street.
- The Center for Craft will be on your left about halfway down the block.

Recommended parking lots are the McLaurin and Masonic parking lots directly across Broadway from the Center for Craft. Parking is also available on the street or in one of these nearby decks: Rankin Parking Garage, Wall Street Garage, Civic Center Garage, and Biltmore Avenue Garage.

Hotel Parking

Parking is \$10/night for hotel guests (discounted rate for LNC participants staying at the hotel) and will be added to guests' bills as an incidental charge. Room keys will be programmed to work the gates in and out. If a key does not work for any reason, there is an assistance button at the top of the meter that will ring to the front desk for guests to verify name and room number to be buzzed in. Valet parking is \$25/day.



All visitors must register their vehicles <u>in advance</u> and print a separate parking permit <u>for each day</u> to display during session.

Important Parking Details for UNC Asheville

- 1. You must have a pre-printed permit, a separate pass for each day, to park in any UNCA lot. **Follow the steps below PRIOR TO leaving for Asheville**. You will need the following to register your vehicle:
 - Driver License State and Number
 - Vehicle Make, Model, and Year
 - Vehicle License Plate Number and State of Issuance
 - Vehicle Insurance Provider
- 2. Visit <u>UNC Asheville Visitor Parking Permit</u>
 - Select "Register/Purchase Printable Permits" under "Visitor, Summer, and Conference Passes."
 - Select Permit Type: "21-22 Visitor Daily \$0.00"
 - Enter EFP Start Date: "April 6, 2022"
 - Reason for Visit: "Leadership North Carolina Environment Session"
 - Complete the rest of the fields with your personal and vehicle details.
 - Follow all of the steps above again but enter "April 7, 2022" for your permit for Thursday.
- 3. Once you have completed the process for <u>each day</u>, you will be emailed a separate parking permit for each day. Print both permits and bring them with you to Asheville.
- 4. Display the appropriate permit on your vehicle's dashboard during your time on the UNCA campus both Wednesday and Thursday. Permits are NOT transferable between vehicles.
- 5. You may park in any lot labeled "Visitor," "All Permit," or "Non-Residential Student." Do NOT park in spots blocked by cones—these are reserved for session presenters.
- 6. The closest lots are Lots 9 and 11 (see map). Once the lower section of the Lot 9 deck fills up, additional parking is available across the street in Lot 11 (recommended) or in the upper deck of Lot 9. If you prefer to park in the upper section of Lot 9, you'll need to exit the lower level by turning left and left again to access the upper portion of the deck.
- 7. After parking, enter through the main doors of the arena and follow the hallway down the left side of the arena to the Mountain View Room.


Footwear Reminder

Parking Instructions and Walking Directions to Meeting Location

Suggested parking areas are flagged on the following map. While you may park in any spot not labeled as reserved, campus will be busy and spots outside these lots limited.

- 1. Pass the south and north entrances to campus.
- 2. Pass the Kittredge Theater on the right.
- 3. Take the next right to turn into the Kittredge Theater "Primary Parking" lot and park.
- 4. If the Kittredge Theater lot is full, additional parking is available on the other side of Warren Wilson Road near the Chapel. Follow signs to "Additional Parking."
- 5. Follow the walking route from your parking location, marked with the dashed lines on the map below, for the 5-10 minute walk to reach the Gladfelter Student Center. We are meeting in the Canon Lounge, to the left when you enter the building.



Guiding Principles

- What personal history am I bringing to the conversations?
- What are my biases?
- What do I already think?
- Am I only hearing the things that reinforce what I already think?

Class XXIX Team Agreements

- Accountability: Accept responsibility for your actions and speech, and encourage the same in others by fully participating, openly sharing, and actively listening, which will foster trust and respect.
- **Authenticity**: Be authentic by sharing your truth, speaking with candor, and contributing to building safe spaces with respect, honesty, and support for each other.
- **Candor**: Speak openly, honestly, and directly, while always maintaining respect for the listener and the process.
- **Clarity**: Provide clarity in communication that is both positive and assumes positive intent of others, and also demonstrates engagement in our activities and tasks.
- **Communication**: Communicate with positive intent, authenticity, and respect; remembering that listening is critical to communication, and that we must listen to learn and listen to understand not to react.
- **Engagement**: Be here now by being present and engaged, actively participating and supporting others.
- **Enjoyment**: Increase enjoyment by using humor to foster a positive environment, where authenticity is respected.
