Dillon Tyler currently works for the International Civil Rights Center & Museum, which is housed in the Sit-In landmark Woolworth's building and is a leading site on the U.S. Civil Rights Trail and an International Site of Conscience. As part of the interpretive staff, Dillon takes a leading role in Museum operations as Tour Coordinator and Administrative Assistant. Aiding in a wide variety of areas, he has served the Museum in increasing the efficiency of fundraising, outreach, operations, exhibit design, bookkeeping, and community engagement. Seeking to expand the Museum's message of civil and human rights education and progressive enlightenment, Dillon has actively worked with several government officials, nonprofit leaders, and change makers, enjoying personal connections with former and current politicians including Elizabeth Warren, Bernie Sanders, Beto O'Rourke, Ted Budd, and a number of local, county, and state politicians.

As a victim of a 2006 school shooting which occurred at Orange High School in Hillsborough, Dillon has also broadened his work to include mitigating gun violence. In 2018, Dillon organized and hosted the Marjory Stoneman Douglas students at the International Civil Rights Center & Museum — along with original Sit-In participants from 1960 — to collaborate and discuss intergenerational tactics used to create non-violent change. His work also took him to New York City, where he was invited to speak at a non-violence summit on Staten Island.

Dillon is a native of Durham, NC. He earned his Bachelor of Arts in Political Science with a concentration in Pre-Law from The University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 2016, where he also presided as his graduating class's Tassel Turner. As a student leader, Dillon was active in several organizations, including the Student Government Association (as Senator and President Pro Tempore), and Dean of Students Office Conduct Team. Dillon also enjoyed working for the Walt Disney Company in a college internship program. After graduation, he turned his eye to public service in a larger domain, where he served as a member of the North Carolina Democratic Party's State Executive Committee, Guilford County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council, and UNC-Greensboro Spartan Legislative Network.

In his spare time, Dillon enjoys writing and acting. His stories and projects have been featured in local news publications, The Guardian, and The New York Times.

Banu Valladares joined Charlotte Bilingual Preschool (CltBP) in August 2017. Under her leadership, CltBP expanded preschool program capacity from 108 to 144 children in 2018 with the Green Room pilot, enrolling English-speaking students alongside Spanish-speaking students for the first time to accelerate language acquisition and facilitate the flow of social capital. In 2019, Valladares established critical strategic partnerships with MECK Pre-K and ParentChild+, enabling CltBP to provide an extended-day preschool program and a home visiting intervention for the first time, deepening impact for students and increasing accessibility for working families. Valladares has led restructuring of staff roles for efficiency, excellence, and growth, as well as an asset-based redesign of the Family Program. Valladares has grown the CltBP organization to support these successes, doubling the operating budget to \$2M. During her tenure Valladares has also prioritized building an engaged Board of Directors who represent the diversity of our community – now nearly half of CltBP Board members identify as Latinx, two thirds speak Spanish, and members include two CltBP alumni parents.

Prior to joining CltBP, Valladares moved to Charlotte from Venezuela to attend UNC-Charlotte, earning a Master's degree in literature. Valladares gained extensive experience from a career in education, the arts, and the humanities, serving for many years with the North Carolina Humanities Council, the North Carolina Arts Council, and as the Executive Director of SonEdna. She has led statewide arts and education programs, specializing in forming strategic partnerships with national, state, and local agencies. A proven leader with experience in managing statewide programs, resources, and staff, Valladares also has nearly twenty years of experience writing and securing grants up

to \$500K. Her experience also includes providing capacity-building support to community-based African American, Asian American, Latinx, and American Indian cultural arts organizations.

He later taught high school social studies and coached high school basketball and football. He served for three years as principal of a school covering grades 1 - 12 before joining the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction as a specialist in school desegregation and race relations.

During his 21 years of service with the Department of Public Instruction, he earned promotions first to assistant and then associate state superintendent. After retiring from Public Instruction on December 31, 1990, he served for 5 years and 3 months as executive director of the North Carolina Association of School Administrators.
